The region covers an area of 163,886 square kms and has a population of 26,400 residents. Outback Arts supports and promotes arts and culture in the far west by working across a broad range of regional community arts development programs and initiatives. Outback Arts works directly with artists, individuals, community groups and local government, supporting communities and sectors that have limited access to arts and culture.

FROM THE //

2022 has seen Outback Arts moving at pace again delivering quality arts initiatives and experiences across the Bourke, Brewarrina, Coonamble, Cobar, Walgett, Bogan and Warren local government areas, a collective region which comprises no less than slightly over one fifth of the state of New South Wales.

The Gallery at OBA has been at capacity this last year, hosting numerous exhibitions including yet another successful Outback Archies Art Prize Exhibition. In addition, the many artworks of Volker Leder have been on display since January. As many of you would be aware, the expansive collection of works, in excess of 150, were bequeathed to Outback Arts before Mr Leder's death in 2017. His works are created with oils and watercolours with subjects ranging from still life to landscapes to portraits. His ability to illuminate the colours of the Australian landscape has won awards and the hearts of many admirers. This exhibition showcased works spanning decades, observing the 30 years he spent living in Lightning Ridge.

This year has seen OBA supporting a number of other exhibitions and events including but not limited to events in Walgett, Warren, Marthaguy, Carinda, Coonamble and Cobar. Two of the highlights of recent events was the opening of the Standing Stories Sculpture Walk in Bourke, a new and valuable cultural asset, and a great addition to the ongoing 'Living Arts and Culture' project and the always colourful, Pave the Way to Gular, Street Art Festival.

This past year also saw our ED, Jamie-Lea Trindall appointed to the prestigious role of Chairperson of the Create NSW Aboriginal Arts and Culture Artform Advisory Board. For a number of years Jamie-Lea has been an active member of this Board, which provides recommendations and advice to the NSW Arts, Tourism, Youth and Aboriginal Affairs Minister on strategic directions for the Arts sector. We have also welcomed Lorraine (Rainy) King into the position of Aboriginal Arts Officer. The Aboriginal Arts Officer program is funded by the Federal, Indigenous Visual Arts Industry Support program (IVAIS). This funding program is highly competitive with regional New South Wales receiving limited representation as successful applicants. Outback Arts were thrilled to be successfully funded, for an extended term of two years, 2022-2023.

This now sees the end of my term as chairperson of the board of Outback Arts. I'd like to thank the board for the opportunity. OBA does fantastic work with individuals, organisations and government to generate, promote and advocate for the arts and creative industries in our region and I'm grateful to have been able to support the organisation over the last few years and wish the board and the team every success in the coming years.

We began 2022 in the thick of planning several regional youth activities such as Gravity and Walgett Fashion Week as well as, opening the newly restructured Country Arts Support Program funding round. In reading through the data for 2022 the unbridle support and enthusiasm for our programming across the region is evident in the audiences engaged and the spaces that were activated.

Professional Development was a major focus of our Capacity Building for 2022 and we delivered a real cross section of opportunities for individuals to get involved in. A highlight was the first In Our Hands programming event, the collective of 10 emerging Aboriginal Curators in partnership with Arts North West headed to Sydney for some in depth program and mentoring with some of the most recognised and celebrated in their fields such as artist Jonathan Jones and First Nations Director Powerhouse Emily McDaniel. As the peak organisation for all things Regional Arts Development for the far west, so much of what Outback Arts does remains unseen, many ideas and planning sessions, talking through opportunities with those that reach out for assistance, advocacy, advice, support and being there for the many things that crop up and need a little creative flair. As the Executive Director of Outback Arts, I am incredibly proud of the small but dedicated team that have delivered our services across the region over the last 12 months.

2022 was a remarkable year for celebrating the stories of our region, and although these beautiful outcomes were such a highlight for 2022, I want to also acknowledge they are developed with community, through consultation, planning and activity that is

sometimes over several years. Hence why the launch of scultpure walk and the mini-series of Standing Stories films of the Bourke Sculpture project was so exciting! These films are of the highest quality, with stunning visuals and are a credit to the story-teller and videographer Andrew Hull, the project development from its conception through to installation had taken 5 years. These sculptures will continue to celebrate the stories of Bourke as vital resources and reminders for both education and history for years to come.

Staying with the theme of celebrating the regions stories we launched our second major podcast story collection in partnership with our adopted sisters from Signal Creative with round three coming to the villages in 2023. Be sure to listen in to the characters, adventures and the best stories never told from across the region on all podcast platforms with Outback Outloud. We were beyond thrilled to work with some incredible partners throughout the year, building partnerships in the industry is vital to supporting our artists in their careers and goes a long way in promoting our region including at an international level; we could not be prouder of our regions representation at the National Indigenous Art Fair. Or being called on for the Chairs position for Create NSW Aboriginal Arts and Culture Artform Advisory Board by the Minister the Hon. Ben Franklin MLC, not to mention our donation from the Powerhouse Museum.

Enjoy this annual report for all it has to offer in data captured, we hope it speaks volumes to the creativity, enthusiasm, and tenacity of our region right now.

Outback Outloud is a community podcast and oral history recording project by Outback Arts, delivered in partnership with Signal Creative delivered over 2021 and 2022.

4000 LISTENERS

The major outcome of Outback Outloud was the launch of a fully developed podcast series available on all major listening platforms. All community members were encouraged to come along and record their stories. These recordings are unique perspectives, 100% unscripted, and are the greatest stories never told.

10 WORKSHOPS

All community members were encouraged to come along and record their stories, resulting in over 150 hours of recordings being made, across the Warren, Nyngan and Coonamble Shires.

The podcast series Season 2 has 8 x 20-30 minute Episodes and was ranked in the top 20 Australian Documentary Podcast Series for 2022.

This project also involved free community workshop sessions where attendees learn to use accessible tools to record their own stories and interview others in their community. Series one was completed in 2021, capturing stories from Walgett, Brewarrina, Bourke and Cobar Shires.

REGIONAL FUTURES

15 REGIONS Regional Futures is a state-wide program managed by the NSW Regional Arts Network and funded by Create NSW. This two-year program will commission artists to create work and develop conversations that explore their vision of the future, about the place where they live and create, providing insight into the issues, challenges and opportunities for regional NSW.

Twenty-nine artists from across NSW have been announced as participants in the state-wide Regional Futures project. Representing the Outback Arts region is Andrew Hull, who is a writer and performer of poetry, prose and song. He's also an artist, photographer and musician who works solo and in collaborations with other artists.

From the "Back-O-Bourke" in Western NSW - Hully - as he's more commonly known - is passionate and enthusiastic about the region and will develop a work that tells the story of our region.

17 LGA'S The Outback Archies Art Prize is an Outback Arts project, which aims to shine a light on the diverse and talented creatives in the region, as they celebrate and explore the theme 'Legends and Landscapes'. Over 80 ARTWORKS are featured in the exhibition coming from the far-flung rural areas of not only the Outback Arts region of Bourke, Brewarrina, Bogan, Cobar, Coonamble, Warren and Walgett Shires but also, Gilgandra, Narrabri, Moree, Gunnedah, Liverpool Plains, Gwydir, Tamworth, Broken Hill, Wentworth Shire, Central Darling Shire and the Western Unincorporated Area – that's SEVENTEEN Local Government Areas in total!

The artworks included in this exhibition are presented in four major artwork categories.

They include Photography, Sculpture, Ceramics

and Two Dimensional. In this year's Art Prize the Young Outback Archies category has grown to now include both Primary and Secondary School categories.

The exhibition was opened on Saturday 17 September, celebrated with over 100 artists and community members in attendance and was on display until 28 October 2022.





SCULPTURES

STANDING STORIES

The Outback Arts region gained a valuable cultural asset as the Standing Stories Sculpture Walk in Bourke was opened to the public through the release of the brochure for the self-guided tour.

5 YEARS

The project, which has seen 8 sculptures installed at the Back of Bourke Exhibition Centre (in Bourke) has been over 5 years in development. Facilitated by the Bourke Shire Council with funding provided by the NSW Government, the concept gained momentum after an initial concept was supported by the regional arts body, Outback Arts.

Each of the sculptures represents a different story, and a different aspect of Aboriginal culture and storytelling. Members of the Bourke community contributed their stories to the project and worked with a local artist to conceptualise those stories into three-dimensional forms. Featuring stories from Jason Dixon, Kristy Kennedy, Minnie Kelly, Dot Martin, Phillip Sullivan, Maxine Mackey, George Orcher, and Brian Smith. Design by Andrew Hull and crafted by Wangstone Studio and John Brady.

With the release of the 12-page brochure, visitors to Bourke can follow the self-guided tour of the works, read the stories, and through QR codes, access films of the storytellers talking about the work.

THOUSAND DOLLARS

COUNTRY ARTS SUPPORT PROGRAM

A diverse range of arts and cultural projects within the Outback Arts region received a little over \$17,000 in Country Arts Support Program (CASP) grants. CASP provides grants for local arts and community organisations to encourage the development of and public engagement with arts and culture in regional NSW.

8 PROJECTS

- Warren Chamber Music Festival Education Week Warren Chamber Music Festival Incorporated (\$3,000) The 2022 Education Week program will create an immersive and inspiring environment for people living and working in rural NSW. Providing 12 opportunities for music-making for community members of all ages.
- » Curious Visitors Descend on the Billboards Gulargambone Community Enterprises Co-operative Ltd (\$2,000) Building on Gulargambone's extensive public art scene, three large double-sided Billboards display six murals. These billboard-style murals are further enhanced by integrated sculptural works. Curious visitors such as birds, reptiles or insects.
- » Resin Workshop The Marsh Collection (\$2,000) Rowie Hawley delivered multiple resin workshops in her local community and surrounds. Providing the opportunity for participants to learn what resin is, how to work with it and how to create their own unique resin platter.
- » Professional photography class and exhibition Burren Junction Parents & Citizens Association (\$2,263) Burren Junction Primary School (BJPS) P&C delivered a professional photography workshop offered to all its students and an art exhibition displaying a photograph from each participant professionally printed on canvas. The workshop was conducted at BJPS and the exhibition held at the BJ community hall.



CAPACITY BUILDING //

- Explore your creativity Brewarrina Shire Council (\$1,500) Council provided an extension of their very successful 2021 Resin workshops. With such a great demand for this workshop, this extension made the opportunity available for those who missed out last year. Participants learned how to work with resin and took home 3 items of work. Workshops took place in August at the Brewarrina Visitor Information Centre.
- » Art on the Bogan Lynette Quinton (\$1,000)
 Established painters Lyn Quinton and Lynn Hodge delivered a guided Plein air painting workshop over two days, on the Bogan River. At least 12 participants were provided with the required materials to develop their skills, with the outcome of completed artworks and an exhibition.
- » Night Watch Parliament Bringing night birds into the light RiverSmart Australia Ltd (2,237) Night Watch Parliament is a multisensory exhibition featuring the Barking, Powerful, Sooty, Masked and Grass owls which are all threatened species. The exhibition aims to raise awareness, educate and initiate action to preserve these magnificent raptors, by engaging the audience through art, sounds, film and workshops.
- Sound and Stories Installation Cobar High
 School Parents and Careers Association
 (\$3,000) Cobar High School students showcase
 their creativity and love of story-telling through
 documenting memories of the Cobar water tank,
 now know as Cobar Sound Chapel. Students
 utilise the sound system in the Sound Chapel,
 intertwining music and the voices of local
 community members. Composer Elizabeth
 Jigalin facilitated this process through a
 weeklong residency.









YOUTH CAPACITY BUILDING //

15 WORKSHOPS

15 GRAVITY

140 PARTICIPANTS The GRAVITY program delivered 15 free 75 minute workshops in the Outback Regional centres of Nyngan, Coonamble, Warren, Bourke, Brewarrina, Cobar and Walgett. GRAVITY workshops combined the learning elements of contemporary dance and aerial apparatus (Hoop and Silks). The program offered fun, dynamic, challenging and safe training in aerial arts. The team of extraordinary instructors on the program included Emma Hoy from Signal Creative and amazing international guest artist Cher Albrecht the director of 'Aerial Sports' aerial acrobatics studio in the ACT.

Participants aged 12-17 learned contemporary dance and a combination of tricks on the aerial apparatus during the session. Many of the 120 participants learned a complete routine and short performance sequence.





WORKSHOPS

WALGETT FASHION WEEK

120 PARTICIPANTS

A series of 7 creative design workshops were facilitated by Signal Creative and feature artist Krystal Hurst. Participants presented their original pieces in a celebratory professional photographic shoot taken by female artist Prudence Upton. All featured garments and accessories created were by the female participants, including newer jewellery pieces made with female Indigenous artist Krystal Hurst.

All participants were invited to Brewarrina to attend the community's Baiame's Ngunnhu Festival where Lily Shearer and a group of local women enjoyed presenting the garments.



ABORIGINAL ARTS DEVELOPMENT //

DHINAWAN SISTERS

Coonamble Dhinawan Sisters is a pilot program funded by the Department of Regional NSW to engage young Aboriginal women between the ages of 17-25 to become involved in the creative industries and gain experience, leading to employment opportunities. Training is lead by Outback Arts and delivered in the Centre, with partnerships established with other local and regional service providers.

artist and Arts & Dementia Coordinator for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander programs' at the Museum of Contemporary Art Australia and Jake Duczynski his team from Studio Gilay who have been the winners of the Walkley Award for Multimedia Storytelling.

All of the facilitators were incredibly generous with their time and knowledge, providing valuable learning and inspiration. This program was funded by the Australian Government through the ILA project grant funds.






ABORIGINAL ARTS DEVELOPMENT //

MAYI FESTIVAL — BOURKE

This one-day arts, culture featured spiritual and cultural leaders from the 26 language groups from Bourke and surrounds, live performances from local and national bands, arts organisations, community services and local businesses.

Headlining performers include Malyangapa
Barkindji rapper and winner of FBi's 2020 SMAC
Awards for the 'Next Big Thing' Barkaa; Gomeroi
hip hop star Kobie Dee; and Minjungbal/
Gudjinburra rapper and Triple J Unearthed Artist
of the Year JK-47. The event also featured local
talent including The Voice AU 2022 featured
band Castlereagh Connection also local act Bell
River Band.

As a project partner, Outback Arts presented a market stall featuring artwork by more than 10 local Aboriginal artists alongside the Living Arts and Culture Exhibition and Our Stories films that showcases a snapshot of 30 Knowledge Holders and Artists from the region.



Major project partners included ACE (Arts & Cultural Exchange, Paramatta) and Bourke Aboriginal Corporation Health Service (BACHS), funded by the NSW Department of Health, Crown Resorts Foundation and the Packer Family Foundation.

BARAYAGAL CHOIR

Six Sydney Conservatorium of Music (SCM) jazz performance students of the Aboriginal Music Ensemble 'Sound Circle', the Barayagal choir directed by Nardi Simpson made up of 12 singers, and The Stiff Gins Nardi Simpson, Kaleena Briggs and pianist Kevin Hunt toured Lightning Ridge, Brewarrina and Walgett, 30th Sept – 2nd Oct with the financial assistance of Outback Arts.

At each place community were treated to Nardi's songs of Yuwaalaraay culture with the local elders and young ones. Nardi composes the songs with her knowledge of her Yuwaalaraay culture. This was part of Nardi's mission for the visit, a Wellbeing Exchange – to show the community the potentials of living more closely with language and cultural storyline through song.

NATIONAL INDIGENOUS ART FAIR

Outback Arts presented a large and diverse market stall at the National Indigenous Art Fair held at, The Rocks Sydney. Over 15 artists had their artworks featured, including ceramics, paintings, photography, artifacts, weaving, and digital artwork. It was excellent to have regional NSW artists represented to such an audience and raise awareness of the rich culture that exists in our region.

NIAF provided attending artists with a 2-day professional development program that involved discussions with First Nations Curators, a workshop learning how to protect their rights, and a behind-the-scenes tour at the Art Gallery of NSW and their conservations labs. Supported through The Australian Government Indigenous Visual Arts Industry Support.

POWERHOUSE MAAS — DONATION TO THE OUTBACK

In August, Outback Arts were thrilled to secure a donation of specialised Gallery equipment from the Powerhouse Museum – Museum of Applied Arts and Sciences, Sydney. It was no easy feat transporting the equipment, requiring a large truck and a driver, we relied on the support of family and friends to assist the Outback Arts team in the process.

The donation included gallery benches, plinths, perspex display units and more. These items may appear simple but are very costly to a non-profit organisation and are not easily supplied in our rural area. Outback Arts is not the only community gallery space in the region and with this ongoing partnership Outback Arts and MAAS will be able to support the broader creative community in the region, helping to support the professional presentation of artists work and promote the Outback region as a primary tourist destination for arts and cultural experiences.



WALGETT COMMUNITY WORKING PARTY

Partnership support was provided to the Department of Regional NSW and ThinkPlace to support the proposal and creation of a creative community space for collaborations, and community engagement opportunities. The concept is driven by The Walgett Community Working Party, Funded by Dept Regional NSW and facilitated by ThinkPlace. Outback Arts is supporting this concept space delivery through assisting with exhibition artwork and sales opportunities, workshop artists and providing long term support for a gallery space in the Walgett Community. The initial Pop Up was to run for three weeks although proving successful the space has stayed functional well into the future.

'Colour, Country, Silkscreen and Me' by Lisa Wheeler'

Living between Walgett and Coonamble Shires, Lisa is a local printmaker artist who uses the medium of silkscreen to explore her relationship with the place she calls home. As both artist and a farmer, Lisa is every day observing and interacting with this country. It both inspires and challenges. Lisa has been an artist for many years continually working on her practice with the support of Outback Arts staff. This body of work is her most significant collection to date and has now been selected to exhibit at Campbelltown Arts Centre, as part of their partnership with Outback Arts annual art prize the Outback Archies. Thursday evening 10 March, Lisa held an opening event for her exhibition, welcoming around 50 visitors to the gallery that evening.



Mosses and Marshes is an exhibition of video, sound, prints and paintings by artists Andrew Howe (Shropshire, UK) and Kim V. Goldsmith (NSW, Australia) from their collaborative Mosses and Marshes project undertaken between 2019–2022. This project spans two countries, both with Ramsar listed wetlands of international importance. It brings together artists, community, land managers and scientists to reimagine the future of these landscapes and the place they have in our communities.

A project by Netwaste this exhibition and competition gives aspiring and professional artists the chance to explore and share their waste reduction message and provides a wonderful opportunity for all community members including children, to showcase their artistic ability. 'The Unfolding Landscape' By Jude Fleming

Jude Fleming is a multidisciplinary artist - drawing, painting, making collages and artist books. She shares her passion for art making with weekly classes at Westwing Studio, Warren. This exhibition celebrates the unfolding landscape, the landscape of geography and of the mind, as folding concertina artist books. As part of her exhibition, Jude also presented a workshop -'How to create an Artist Book' and an artist talk event where she shared insight into her art practice and how she translates and recorded her life experience through her artwork.

Standing Stories

Standing Stories is an outdoor gallery of three-dimensional artworks (sculptures) installed at the 'Back O Bourke' Exhibition Centre. The sculptures each represent a story or perspective from a local Aboriginal person or family in the area.

As part of this project, a film has been produced for each sculpture, capturing its form and recording the stories of those involved in its concept. These films were on display in the Outback Arts Gallery as an exhibition. They are also hosted on the Outback Arts Living Arts and Culture website.

GEORGE WILLIAMS LOCATIONS 'TIME & LIGHT'

George Williams, originally from Brewarrina, visited Walgett in 1979 to visit the family, and twenty years later calls Walgett home to himself, his five children and his eighteen grandchildren. A Barkindji man on his mother's side, his art derives from his cultural heritage. As he learned more and more about his history, his culture, and the story of his family, art became more important to him as a key way to connect with his family and Country. George works in a range of art forms through which he expresses his Barkindji, Ngemba culture, including the most contemporary of forms, photography.

George is very dedicated to his practice and Outback Arts are proud to have supported him in having his first solo exhibition, which then toured across the region.

OVERVIEW

The Outback Arts board is made of seven Shire Council representatives and three independents who have an interest in arts and culture in our communities. The board representatives provide the organisation with a diverse range of professional skills and a contact point for communication within each community.



Outback Arts Executive Director was appointed Chairperson of the Aboriginal Arts and Culture Artform Board of Create NSW. In September, Jamie–Lea was personally invited by the Minister for the Arts Hon Ben Franklin, to take on the Chairperson role, representing the Aboriginal Arts & Culture Board she has been a part of for the past three years. This invitation saw Jamie–Lea taking over from internationally acclaimed playwright and artistic director Mr Wesley Enoch AM.

The Outback Arts Region Gains Aboriginal Arts Officer

Outback Arts are very pleased to welcome Lorraine (Rainy) King into the position of Aboriginal Arts Officer. Lorraine will be based at Outback's regional office in Coonamble but will service and support Aboriginal Artists across the Shires of Bourke, Brewarrina, Bogan, Cobar, Coonamble, Warren and Walgett.

Lorraine is a qualified Special Education Primary teacher with 20+ years of experience. She is also on accomplished artist, predominately applying her creative skills to photography and ceramics. She will apply her wealth of experience and creative skills to the delivery

of workshops across the region, providing increased access to a range of opportunities for members of these communities to learn creative skills.

The Aboriginal Arts Officer program is funded by the Federal, Indigenous Visual Arts Industry Support program (IVAIS). This funding program is highly competitive with regional New South Wales receiving limited representation as successful applicants. Outback Arts were thrilled to be successfully funded, for on extended term of two years, 2022-2023.


